"TEACH US TO PRAY"

The disciples asked Jesus, "Lord teach us to pray," (**LUKE 11:1**).

Imagine that. The disciples had to learn how to pray. The same is true for you and me. In fact, we are always learning how to pray.

Jesus is the only expert at prayer. For the rest of us, we are always learning from Jesus and from His Word how to pray and what to pray.

A little child learns to talk by listening to her parents speak. So you and

I learn to talk to God because God speaks to us and we repeat God's word back to Him as we pray.

To help us, Jesus gives us the best prayer of all. It's the prayer he prays to his Father. The Lord's Prayer. His prayer covers all the bases.

There is nothing in the whole world that you need to pray for that isn't covered in this prayer!

We keep praying it our entire lives because as Luther says: "in these seven petitions are found all our anxieties, needs, and perils, which we ought to bring to God" and the "great things" He intends to give and do for us.

The Lord's Prayer is our guide for all other prayers. We pray it daily and often, but there are also many other prayers to help us learn to speak in boldness and confidence to our Heavenly Father.

For example, we can uses the Psalms as our very own prayers. Luther considered the Psalms the Christian's prayer book.

In addition, there are many many incredible prayers that have been handed down to us over the centuries through the church's liturgies, daily prayer offices, hymns, collects and catechetical materials such as the Small Catechism that all have their roots in the Scriptures. Luther, in fact, intended his Small Catechism to be a prayer book as much as concise summary of Christian doctrine for teaching.

The upcoming season of Lent has a focus on repentance and prayer. With the current state of the world, perhaps you have found yourself on your knees in prayer much more these days. In moments of frustration, anxiousness, deep concern and even anger, I have found the Psalms and the Litany *(pages 288-289 in Lutheran Service Book)* to be exceedingly helpful prayers to lift before our Heavenly Father.

During these challenging days, I invite you to join me in praying for the Church, the world, and for all those in need.

As we continue to learn to pray from our Lord, from His Word using some of these forms of prayer handed down us, we approach Him with the sure and certain confidence that He hears our prayer. We come knowing that He desires to help us, to give us His blessings and to do for us great things in Christ our Lord.

French Onion Chicken

Prep 5 minutes Cook 25 minutes Total Time 30 minutes

INGREDIENTS

2 medium yellow onions thinly sliced into rings

1 C. + 3 TBLSP. beef broth divided

4 boneless & skinless chicken breasts pound to 1/2 in.

1 tsp. Italian blend herbs/Italian seasoning

4 slices provolone cheese

34 cup parmesan cheese

3 TBLSP. butter
1 tablespoon oil
salt and pepper to taste

2 tablespoons flour 4 slices swiss cheese

fresh thyme or parsley and cracked black pepper for topping (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS

01) Preheat oven to bake at 400 degrees OR broil on low. 02) In a large oven-safe skillet over medium-high heat, melt butter. 03) Add onions and 3 tablespoons beef broth and saute onions for 3-4 minutes until translucent. **04)** Continue to cook, stirring occasionally so the onions don't burn, for about 15 minutes longer until browned and very tender. **05**) Use tongs or a fork to transfer to a bowl and cover to keep warm. **06)** While onions are cooking, prepare the chicken by drizzling with oil, then seasoning with salt and pepper (to taste) and Italian herbs. 07) Once onions have finished cooking and are removed from the pan, cook chicken for 4-5 minutes on each side (don't clean out the pan between the onions and chicken) until browned on both sides. (Chicken may not be fully cooked through yet, that is okay). **08)** Transfer chicken to a plate and cover to keep warm and return the onions to the pan. Sprinkle flour over the onions and stir for 1 minute over medium-high heat. **09)** Add beef broth and continue to cook, stirring throughout, until mixture comes to a boil. Season with salt and pepper to taste. 10) Return chicken to pan and spoon some of the sauce over each piece of chicken. 11) Top chicken with one slice of provolone each, then one slice of swiss, then 1/4 of the parmesan cheese. 12) Transfer skillet to your preheated oven and cook for about 10 minutes until chicken is cooked through completely and cheeses are melted.


